# A memorable weekend in Plestin

### The orange tree – symbol of a growing friendship between two towns

A SONG from Plestin sung at the first get-togethers between our two towns 30 years ago was the inspiration for our gift to our hosts in Brittany to mark the 'pearl' anniversary of our twinning link.

Launceston chairman Jill Whitechurch explained: "To mark our long friendship we were inspired by your singing of the song The Orange Tree, whose last two lines are a good description of our 30 years' twinning: It has flourished and it has produced the sweet fruits

She thanked everyone who contributed to the warm welcome we received, which represented a great deal of work and organisation.

A group of more than 60 from Launceston – including ten children – enjoyed a weekend of memorable meals, singing, dancing, discovery, Saturday was spent with families but everyone came together in the evening for a reception hosted by a founder member of twinning, Andre Lucas, in his capacity as Mayor of Plestin, followed by a traditional Breton dinner.

#### Warm welcome

The Launceston visitors received a warm welcome from Mado Menou, president of the Plestin twinners, and the Mayor – both looking forward to a continuing long and strong friendship. On behalf of the Launceston association, Jill handed over a framed photograph of a huge group of twinners from both sides of the Channel which was taken at the Lawrence House Museum during the 30<sup>th</sup> celebrations in May.

A traditional Breton pot au feu provided the main course of the meal which ended with some rather special gateaux. They consisted of three cakes – chocolate, mango or strawberry – each beautifully decorated with edible fruit and flowers.

The table decorations were a series of brightly wrapped pots of flowers and foliage – and the Launceston guests were invited to take home one of the pots which had been specially planted and prepared by Mado.

#### Children's games

After the meal, several of the children set up their own table and once again it was France v England in a series of friendly, noisy games.

During the evening, the Plestin twinners displayed a beautiful, locally-made pottery bowl which was put up for raffle and won by one of the French twinners.



No twinning evening would be complete without singing, dancing and music. A group of Launceston twinners performed a selection of traditional songs – a couple in French with an interesting Breton twist - and Plestin responded with a medley of well-known songs.

#### Valley of sound



The final day offered some fascinating opportunities to explore the Valley of Sound – a success with the children and a touch of second childhood for the adults.

For hours the wooded valley echoed with extraordinary sounds and laughter. At every turn there were pipes to blow down – each group producing different sounds, tubes to listen at, pumps to stamp on, and arrays of every sort of material on which to tap, bang or drum.

Alongside the valley was a 'park' laid out to represent the inner ear. It was an educational experience both for showing the working of the ear and for trying to decipher the French explanations along the way. The interesting sanitary-ware

waterfall (right) shows how waste is flushed from the ear to the nasal passages!

There was also a separate art trail to be explored during the day. Some French hosts arranged other activities for their guests – and there were a lot of stories swapped on the way home.
